PAPER SUBMISSION FORMAT GUIDELINES

- 1. Papers should be maximum 20 A-4 (21cm X 29.7cm) pages in length, 1,5 line spaced, lettering times New Roman 12 font, full justification, paragraphs, page margins 2,5 cm for each side. Page numbers should be under the page.
- 2. The first page of the paper should cover the title, abstract (maximum 150 words), keywords (maximum 5 keywords) of the study. Author information should strictly not be written on the submission file. Title, abstract and keywords written both in Turkish and English should be placed successively. If there are any, supporting organizations, etc. should be indicated on the first page.
- **3.** The main body of the text should start on the second page with the introduction part and the text should follow using appropriate major headings.
 - Heading levels should be clearly identified and each level should be uniquely and consistently formatted and/or numbered. The preferred format is as such
 - 1st Level Heading: Left aligned, bold, first letter of each major word capitalized 14 font
 - 2nd Level Heading: Left aligned, bold, first letter of each major word capitalized 12 font
 - 3rd Level Heading: Left aligned, bold, italic, first letter of each major word capitalized 12 font
 - 4th Level Heading: Left aligned, first letter of each major word capitalized 12 font
- **4.** Papers should be maximum 20 pages in length including body text, figures, tables and references.
- **5.** Standard domain notations and abbreviations should be used and they should be defined first time they are used in the body of text. If it is needed notations and abbreviations could be listed in the introduction or in a separate section.
- **6.** All pictures, maps, graphics, photographs, etc. should be considered as figures. Figures should be numbered consecutively and all figures should be cited in the text in a sequential order (e.g. as indicated in Figure 1) with an appropriate number and caption under the figure.
- **7.** Tables should be numbered consecutively and all tables should be cited in the text in a sequential order (e.g. as indicated in Table 1) with an appropriate number and caption over the table.
- **8.** In the body of text names of books, magazines, movies and TV programs should be written in italic, such as in the *Today Show* ... Do not write any words or phrases in italic to emphasize them.
- **9.** Using Numbers When starting a line, write numbers in words, such as "Twenty thesis amongst sixty five, the remaining 45 is about ...".
- **10.**Footnotes should not consist of a reference citation and should be depicted at the relevant, not be listed at the end of the body text.
- **11.**If there is one appendix in study, it should be cited as Appendix in the body of text. If there are more than one appendix, then they should be tagged consecutively and cited as Appendix A, Appendix B, etc. in the body of text.

Reference List

References to other publications should be carefully checked for completeness, accuracy and consistency. Authors should cite publications in the text as

- Single author: (Miller 1991) or Miller (1991)
- Two authors: (Miller and Smith 1994) or Miller and Smith (1994)
- Three authors or more: (Miller et al. 1995) or Miller et al. (1995)
- At the end of the paper a reference list in alphabetical order should be supplied
- All publications by the author with a co-author should be ordered alphabetically by co-author
- All publications by the author alone should be ordered chronologically by year of publication from the eldest to the newest
- All publications by the same author with the same co-author(s) should be distinguished by using small caps such as 1999a and 1999b.
- All publications by the author with several coauthors, ordered chronologically by year of publication.

Surname, Initials (year), "Title of Article", working paper [number if available], Institution or organization, Place of organization, date.

e.g. Moizer, P. (2003), "How Published Academic Research Can Inform Policy Decisions: the Case of Mandatory Rotation of Audit Appointments", working paper, Leeds University Business School, University of Leeds, Leeds, 28 March.

For encyclopedia entries (with no author or editor)

Title of Entry (year). Title of Encyclopedia, volume, edition, pages. Place of publication: Publisher.

e.g. Balkans: History. (1987). Encyclopaedia Britannica içinde (15. Baskı. Cilt. 14, s. 570-588). Chicago: Encyclopaedia Britannica.

(For authored entries please refer to book chapter guidelines above)

For newspaper articles

Surname, Initials (year, date). Article title. Newspaper, pages.

(authored)

e.g. Bruni, F. (2003, 26 December). Pope pleads for end to terrorism and war. New York Times, s.21.

For newspaper articles (non-authored)

Newspaper (year, date), "Article title", pages.

e.g. Daily News (2008,2 February), "Small change", p. 7.

For archival or other unpublished sources

Surname, Initials, (year), "Title of document", Unpublished Manuscript, collection name, inventory record, name of archive, location of archive.

e.g. Litman, S. (1902), "Mechanism & Technique of Commerce", Unpublished Manuscript, Simon Litman Papers, Record series 9/5/29 Box 3, University of Illinois Archives, Urbana-Champaign, IL.

For electronic sources

If available online, the full URL should be supplied at the end of the reference, as well as a date that the resource was accessed.

e.g. Castle, B. (2005), "Introduction to web services for remote portlets", available at: http://www-128.ibm.com/developerworks/library/ws-wsrp/ (accessed 12 November 2007).

Standalone URLs, i.e. without an author or date, should be included either within parentheses within the main text, or preferably set as a note (roman numeral within square brackets within text followed by the full URL address at the end of the paper).
